RICHLAND COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS APRIL 18, 2023

The Richland County Board of Commissioners met on April 18, 2023 at the Richland County Courthouse with Commissioners Nathan Berseth, Tim Campbell, Rollie Ehlert, Terry Goerger and Perry Miller. Others in attendance were Administration Personnel Fossum and DelVal; State's Attorney Kummer; Assistant State's Attorney Rydell; and a Daily News Reporter.

A motion was made by Miller and seconded by Berseth to <u>approve the Agenda</u> <u>as amended.</u> Vote was unanimous.

JEN KLOSTREICH - NRCS GEOLOGY TOUR

Klostreich informed the Commission of a Geology Tour that is being planned. The tour is open to everyone and will be held on July 20.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REPORT

Flood Update

- received 116,000 sandbags 16,000 going to Sargent County
- some rural residents have been calling about sandbags
- filled sandbags two10 ton National Guard Trucks, City Trucks, and five pallets

<u>Train Derailment Update</u>

- Finished cleaning process on rail cars, they are now scrapping the last ten cars
- Environmental Crews will come in after Scrappers are done to start earth work cleanup
- Air Monitoring discontinued as of April 17
- Working with Canadian Pacific Railroad on Grant

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

A small group of visitors was present for the bid openings.

A motion was made by Berseth and seconded by Miller to accept all bids received. Vote was unanimous.

Flood Update

- Antelope drains are flooding
- quite a few roads are closed on the southern area of the County
- a lot of snow left to melt on the northwest area of the County
- some areas will need attention when the flooding is done

Staff Update

A new employee started yesterday but still expecting to be down three employees by mid-June due to resignations/retirements

<u>Christine Intersection -</u> The city would like to make it a 4-way Stop. Sedler reported a traffic study would need to be done, they can't just put up stop signs. He is working with Interstate Engineering on a cost estimate.

<u>Bid Opening - Mill & Bituminous Overlay on CR 8, 8E & 10 N</u> - The following bids were received:

A motion was made by Berseth and seconded by Campbell to accept all bids received. Vote was unanimous.

MISC/CORRESPONDENCE

Miller gave a brief <u>update on Buildings & Grounds</u> - Issues continue with the pigeons at the Courthouse.

Campbell reported he was contacted by an individual wanting to look at <u>a tax</u> <u>foreclosure property in Fairmount</u>; Campbell will work out the details and get a new lock put on the house.

BRAD PAULY - INFRASTRUCTURE IN HOMESTEAD ADDITION

Pauly presented a proposal (copy attached to minutes) to the Board on behalf of the Wahpeton Community Development Corporation as a follow-up to the commitment made by the Commission at a meeting last December (to commit up to \$1.1 million for 19th St and 14th Ave in the Homestead Development- with conditions).

The proposal/request is asking for the County to pay WCDC \$200,000 for every \$10 million tax base.

Fossum asked for clarification on the tax base - is it True & Full Value or Taxable Value.

Following discussion a motion was made by Berseth and seconded by Campbell to reimburse the Wahpeton Community Development Corp \$200,000 for every \$10 million of true & full value as established by the February 1st assessment date. Vote was unanimous.

MISC/CORRESPONDENCE continued

<u>Public Health Report</u> - Danielle Flack reported on the WIC Program. The WIC Program serves income eligible moms and babies up to age 5, they are provided EBT cards for certain foods. The program also assists them with healthy food choices. There are 232 participants in Richland County. 50% of the babies born in North Dakota are on a WIC Program.

<u>Human Service Zone Report</u> - Lynn Flieth distributed a handout and reported on legislative topics related to Human Service Zones including - Budgets, Salary & Benefit inequities, timeline for salary increases, state employment of HSZ, and indirect costs.

A motion was made by Berseth and seconded by Goerger to approve the <u>Liquor License Renewal Application for the Hankinson American Legion</u>. Vote was unanimous.

A motion was made by Berseth and seconded by Goerger to approve the Raffle Permit for the Richland County Wildlife Club. Vote was unanimous.

A motion was made by Berseth and seconded by Miller to approve <u>Site</u> <u>Authorizations for Head of the Red Youth Activities Association for gaming at Terrace Lanes and Texas Crossing</u>. Vote was unanimous.

A motion was made by Berseth and seconded by Campbell to give Monday, July 3 as an additional Paid Holiday to County employees. Discussion followed and the second to the motion was withdrawn by Campbell.

A motion was made by Berseth and seconded by Miller to give Monday, July 3 as an additional Paid Holiday to County employees with the following stipulations for the 24/7 departments - if someone works July 3 they will not be paid overtime, and if not scheduled to work July 3, they would have the selection of another paid day off. Vote was unanimous.
